### Dear Family,

As part of Fire Prevention Week, your child has taken a journey with Sparky the Fire Doge to a natural history museum. ### Smoke Alarm Safety Tips

- ✓ Install smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement. If possible, interconnect all smoke alarms throughout the home, so that when one sounds, they all sound.
- ✓ Ponga detectores de humo en cada habitación, por fuera de cada zona de dormir y en cada nivel de su casa. Si puede, intente que todos los detectores de la casa estén conectados entre sí de forma que si salta uno, suenen todos.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old, or sooner if they do not respond properly. Test alarms, at least monthly, by pushing the test button.
- Cambie todos los detectores de humo cada diez años o antes si no funcionan bien. Por lo menos una vez al mes, apriete el botón para comprobar que los detectores funcionan.
